## **BSN (Post-Licensure and Concurrent Option) Program Information**

- 1. Old Dominion University's Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program is designed to prepare students for careers as practitioners of professional nursing in a variety of health care settings and/or for graduate study in nursing. The program is fully accredited by the Virginia State Board of Nursing and the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education.
- 2. The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (post-licensure curriculum) is designed for students who are registered nurses. A separate application to the School of Nursing is required (priority deadline is June 1). Requirements for admission include; successful completion of all 100-200 level general education and departmental courses, admission to the university and an unencumbered RN license or concurrent enrollment in an RN program at a partner institution.
- 3. Students must begin the program in a Fall or Spring semester. Admission to the University does not guarantee acceptance to the nursing major. Nursing classes may not be taken as non-degree seeking.
- 4. Students can complete all nursing courses in two years with part-time study. By starting in a fall or spring semester, students can complete the program with one year with full-time study.
- 5. As they advance in the program, BSN students are awarded a total of 33 advanced placement credits for NURS 398 and NURS 498. These credits are awarded at no cost to the student.
- 6. A grade of C (2.00) or better is required in all nursing courses to continue in the nursing program. An average of 80% or better on objective tests within a nursing course is required to earn a grade of C (2.00). A cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better is required to continue in the nursing program. A nursing student who fails a nursing course and is readmitted to the nursing program is allowed to repeat the failed course only once. A student may be readmitted to the nursing major only once.
- Course prerequisites are strictly enforced. Please refer to the University Catalog for prerequisites of all courses.
- 8. To satisfy the University's upper division general education requirement, students may take any six credit hours at 300/400 level from outside the College of Health Science (Colleges of Arts and Letters, Business and Public Administration, Education, Engineering and Technology, or Sciences). Students may also meet upper division general education with a minor or previous bachelor's degree.
- 9. The general education requirement in language and culture is met or waived for students who:
  - Completed high school before December 31, 1985 (also applies if GED received after a scheduled graduation of December 31, 1985 or earlier).
  - Completed the third level of one foreign language in high school.
  - Completed the second level in each of two foreign languages in high school.
  - Earned a university-parallel associate's degree approved to meet all lower division general education requirements.
  - Earned a bachelor's degree from a regionally-accredited institution prior to admission to ODU as a second degree student.
  - Have a native language other than English.

If the requirement is not met by one of those means, students must successfully complete the 102F or 111F level of a college foreign language course.

- 10. The Writing Proficiency requirement is satisfied by earning a "C" or better in the following courses: ENGL 110C, ENGL 211C or 221C or 231C, and NURS 490W.
- 11. Students are held individually responsible for the information contained in the University Catalog. Failure to read and comply with University regulations will not exempt students from whatever penalties they may incur.
